AEG Presents Ltd ("AEG") fully supports the aims of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and is committed to preventing acts of forced labour, modern slavery and human trafficking from occurring within its business and supply chain, and imposes the same high standards on its suppliers.

This statement is made in accordance with section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and constitutes AEG's slavery and human trafficking statement for the financial year commencing 1 January 2019 and ending 31 December 2019.

AEG is committed to investing in the highest possible specification of production and infrastructure and works to procure the very best suppliers and consultants to deliver this vision. Our supply chain largely consists of consultants and engineering, production, security, marketing and catering firms.

Our Policies

As part of our commitment to combating modern slavery, we have incorporated conditions into our tender application process and contractual terms into our agreements with our suppliers that require confirmation of compliance with the Modern Slavery Act 2015.

We comply with all applicable employment legislation relating to employee terms and conditions, including pay, and we make sure that all direct employees have the appropriate rights to work.

Our staff are encouraged to highlight concerns regarding modern slavery that they may have, using the appropriate reporting channels.

Our Due Diligence Processes

As part of our efforts to monitor and reduce the risk of slavery and human trafficking occurring within our supply chains, we have implemented a due diligence programme and the abovementioned contractual terms with a primary focus on the suppliers at AEG.

Our procedures are designed to:

- establish and assess areas of potential risk in our business and supply chains
- monitor potential risk areas in our business and supply chains
- reduce the risk of slavery and human trafficking occurring in our business and supply chains
- provide adequate protection for whistle-blowers

Risk and compliance

AEG will regularly evaluate the nature and extent of its exposure to the risk of modern slavery occurring in its supply chain by maintaining open dialogue with all suppliers.

Further actions and sign-off

Following the review of our actions this financial year to prevent slavery or human trafficking from occurring in our business or supply chains, we intend to continue to maintain robust standards to tackle slavery and human trafficking. Currently, however, we do not consider that we operate in a high risk sector.
